

Documentation and Coding: Unstable Angina


Unstable angina is an unpredictable condition in which the heart doesn't get enough blood flow and oxygen. It may occur without warning, even at rest or sleeping.

Documentation Recommendations

Status of Condition	ImprovedWorsening
Specify Vessel	NativeAutologous veinBypass graft
Symptoms	 Occurs at rest Becomes more frequent, severe, or prolonged than the usual pattern Change from usual pattern No response to rest
Link Associated Conditions	By using verbiage: Due to Associated with Secondary to i.e., Atherosclerosis, history of MI, heart disease, etc.
Include Treatment Plan	 Final diagnostic statement Diagnostic results with findings: EKG, echocardiography, or stress test confirming diagnosis of unstable angina Treatment options for unstable angina, including: Coronary angiography, coronary angioplasty, stent, or coronary artery bypass graft procedure, referrals Medications, i.e., Nitroglycerin, Heparin

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Coding Unstable Angina

- American Heart Association guidelines recommend initial treatment of unstable angina in the Emergency Department/Emergency Room (ED/ER).
- When unstable angina is listed separately from coronary artery bypass graft (CABG) and both conditions are supported in the documentation, a combination code from category 125.7x*— Atherosclerosis of coronary artery bypass graft(s) and coronary artery of transplanted heart with unstable angina pectoris—should be coded.
- When unstable angina is listed separately from coronary artery disease (CAD) and both conditions are supported in the documentation, a combination code—I25.110, Atherosclerotic heart disease of native coronary artery with unstable angina pectoris—should be coded.
- Unstable angina is considered an acute condition with life-threatening consequences and would seldom be reported in the office setting.

^{*}Requires additional digit to complete the diagnosis code.

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ICD-10-CM Codes and Descriptions

ICD-10-CM	DESCRIPTION
125.110	Atherosclerotic heart disease of native coronary artery with unstable angina pectoris
125.700	Atherosclerosis of coronary artery bypass graft(s), unspecified, with unstable angina pectoris
125.710	Atherosclerosis of autologous vein coronary artery bypass graft(s) with unstable angina pectoris
125.720	Atherosclerosis of autologous artery coronary artery bypass graft(s) with unstable angina pectoris
125.730	Atherosclerosis of nonautologous biological coronary artery bypass graft(s) with unstable angina pectoris
125.750	Atherosclerosis of native coronary artery of transplanted heart with unstable angina
125.760	Atherosclerosis of bypass graft of coronary artery of transplanted heart with unstable angina
125.790	Atherosclerosis of other coronary artery bypass graft(s) with unstable angina pectoris

Coding Example

Case	A 67-year-old male with a history of CAD was admitted and diagnosed with unstable angina. What is the correct code to submit?
ICD-10-CM	I25.110 – Atherosclerotic heart disease of native coronary artery with unstable angina pectoris
Rationale	As stated in the Coding Clinic, a diagnostic test does not need to be performed during the admission for a diagnosis of CAD to be established. If the physician cites CAD as the underlying cause of the unstable angina, the CAD is listed as the principal diagnosis. If there is documentation of previous testing to confirm the presence of CAD, then this is the link and the CAD should be listed first.

Note: unstable angina without atherosclerosis heart disease (I20.0).
