Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health: A Trauma Informed Approach

Ms. Colon is trained in Trauma Focused-Cognitive Behavioral Therapy, Child Parent Psychotherapy, Attachment Regulation and Comptency (ARC), and other evidence-based treatments. Ms. Colon supervises and trains social work students and psychology interns on the integration of behavioral health in the primary care setting. Ms. Colon has served on panels, conducted in-service trainings, and workshops within the community on domestic violence and its impact on families.

Ms. Colon has a Master of Social Work degree from Fordham University and a Bachelor of Arts in Forensic Psychology from John Jay College of Criminal Justice.

He was the Principle Investigator for the Adolescent Trials Network at the National Institutes of Health (NIH) from 2009-2012. His current clinical interests include working with youths infected with HIV and he is the Health Champion for HIV Medical Services at the Mount Sinai Adolescent Health Center. He also is the primary medical provider of the Transgender Health Project.

Related interests include teaching Adolescent Medicine to Pediatric House staff, Adolescent Fellows, and medical students. Other academic interests include advising the Mount Sinai Medical Record (Epic) on Adolescent Medicine issues and concerns.
